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Memories from the Past

The Centenary Commemorative Booklet will be published by 6th June, 1996. We received many articles for the booklet and would like to share some of them with you here.

We received this article from Mrs. Joan Sonnenstein who became a member of the Administration Staff in 1940.

I joined the staff of Stonehouse Hospital in September, 1940. My salary was £1 per week, which was considered a fair wage for a young girl of 18 years. My designation was "telephonist", but it should really have been "general dogsbody"

before I left the office the matron would say to me, "A nice smile and a cheery word" and off I would go to the wards.

as my jobs were many and varied. The switchboard was situated in a small office at the back of the main building which is now the Doctors' Residence. This room also served as a tea/coffee room for the Nursing Administration Staff and as matron's office. I should say at this point that food rationing was in operation and the rules were very strictly adhered to - so, that I did not get cups of tea or coffee when the maid brought in the silver tray, nor did I expect it. One of my jobs was to count the food coupons which were then sent to the local Food Office, I also checked the accounts against the orders. A job which I enjoyed was going round the military wards giving 10 cigarettes to each patient and also chatting with them - before I left the office to do this, the matron (Miss More) would say to me, "A nice smile and a cheery word" and off I would go to the wards.

Mrs. Sonnenstein returned to work at Stonehouse Hospital in February, 1972 and retired in 1984 Excerpts from a letter receivedfrom Eveline Warnecke (nee Sprotte) who trained at Stonehouse College of Nursing between 1949 and 1954.

Between 1949 and 1954 six German girls came to Stonehouse Hospital to carry out the Nurses' Training Course. Two left for home after 2 years and the others completed their training and passed their 'Finals'.

During my stay at Stonehouse Hospital from June 1950 to December, 1954 the matron was Miss Campbell, (always accompanied by a small dog when paying her visits).

In 1962 after some years out of nursing, raising my daughter, I returned to work at the Red Cross Hospital in my home town in Germany. I was involved in teaching African Nurses who had come to Germany to do a nurse training course and who were not capable of understanding our language at first. I gave them my lecture books which I had brought home to Germany from the training school at Stonehouse. In time, all my African students went on to pass their exams and they returned to Africa to work as nurses.

I would like to wish Stonehouse Hospital all the best on its 100th birthday and I would like to give my kindest regards and best wishes to everybody who remembers me. Mrs. Warnecke lives in Braunschweig, Germany.




Smiles all round at the Ward 6 Centenary Quiz

STONEHOUSE HOSPITAL BY GASLIGHT

While researching the Centenary booklet we had the pleasure of meeting the hospital's oldest member of staff Mrs. Elizabeth Monie, she commenced employment in 1919 as Dr. Sutherland's maid and then she became Matron Miss Thomson's maid. She left to be married and returned to work after the second world war as Matron Miss Campbell's maid.

Mrs. Monie, 95 years old, remembers walking to work from Larkhall on her first day because the trains were on strike! She intended to just work at the hospital for a month and stayed seven years. During her time at the hospital she was-required to stay in the doctor's house and told us how her colleagues would heat their curling tongs using the gaslighting around the house and curl their hair.

Mrs. Monie retired in 1961 and is now resident in Avonhaugh Nursing Home.

CENTENARY COOKS CORNER

GINGER BISCUITS

8 ozs sugar 4 ozs golden syrup 4 ozs margarine 12 ozs S.R. flour 2 teaspoons ginger 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon

1 level teaspoon bicarbonate of soda

1 beaten egg

Place sugar, syrup and margarine in a pan and melt over low heat.

Sift flour, spices and bicarbonate of soda in a bowl. Mix in the melted ingredients and add beaten egg, mix well. Roll teaspoonfuls of the mixture into small balls and place well apart on a greased tray. (an almond can be added to the middle of each ball). Bake in a moderate oven, regulo 4 for about 20 minutes until they are golden and crazed all over.

Leave on baking sheet for 1-2 minutes then cool on a wire tray. (Biscuits will keep for a month).

This recipe was supplied by Miss M. Mitchison, who retired as Nursing Officer in 1980 after 32 years service at Stonehouse Hospital.
