


The "Domonie" under threat of demolition

One of Stonehouse's last remnants of the past is under threat after the Congregational Churches plan to sell off the Camnethan Street School, demolishing it for further development. Built in 1898 this building has served Stonehouse for nearly a century both as a school and as a centre for local organisations. The school closed in 1947 and the children were relocated to Townhead Street school.

Now this fine sandstone building is facing destruction unless a plan can be made to save the school. The potential of Camnethan Hall is limitless as it provides several rooms, a hall and cooking facilities. It would be a shame for the community to lose such an asset, for not only would we be losing another landmark of Stonehouse but we would also be losing a part of our heritage.

Juggernaught Corner

For all its beautifully kept gardens and picturesque weavers cottages Lockhart Street has had to put up with the constant eyesore of the ruined remains of two desolate cottages which have been there for longer than most of us can remember. Apart from being a constant annoyance to the residents of Lockhart Street and New Street it cannot be good news for the image of Stonehouse for those who have to pass through the village en



route to the coast. One day we may see this building coming down sooner than we expect, as how many times have we seen lorries cutting this corner into Lockhart Street narrowly avoiding oncoming traffic.

Only the other day I heard that the buildings concerned were due to come down when the "By-pass" comes to Stonehouse!




Village turns Green

Since our last issue highlighting the problems of the land directly across from the local Co-op, a move has been made by the planning department to list this plot of land within the conservation area. This prevents building on the land which has already been cleared of debris and seeded for grassing in the coming year.

This move by the planning department is all part of a policy to double the amount of listed buildings within the area in the coming year, preserving the image and historical past of the village. Already the redevelopment of Stonehouse has taken its toll. Only through local support and campaigning can we preserve our enviroment.

Avonside Track Club



A vonside Track Club was formed 7 years ago by a group of coaches who split from Stonehouse A.A.C. To begin with the club had 3 coaches and 11 athletes. With no facilities and only the A71 to run along

the club could have folded at any time.

However to the contary Avonside Track Club soon began to flourish and this year were promoted to Division 2 of the Scottish and North Western League after winning the Division 3 title. Avonside will be up against tough opposition next year against the like of Johnnie Walker, Kilmarnock and Ian Skelly Law and District. and as you can see these clubs have a sponsor and Avonside dont.

Avonside have a dedicated committee and 11 dedicated coaches who work tirelessly to keep the club afloat and turning out wining performances from the athletes. Avonside Track Club have a number of Scottish Internationalists past and present in many different disciplines.

Yvonne Ewing was the first member of track club to represent Scotland over cross country in 1988 and at present is working to regain full fitness from a knee injury she sus-

The following year Carole and Gillian Leitch represented Scotland in cross country

and have done on numerous occasions. Although 15 years of age they are still prominent figures in Scottish athletics. Carole represented Scottish schools this year over 1500m. She was the youngest competitor in the race and still managed to finish forth. She has also represented Scottish schools cross country in Ireland. Carole and Gillian have both represented the West District team in cross country and Carole has done the same on the track.

Margaret Wilson won the Scottish Schools Championship for the first time in 1989 throwing the javelin, although only 12 years of age at the time and Stonehouse's youngest ever Scottish Champion. Margaret qualified to represent Scotland in the Celtic nations. Margaret has also represented West District on numerous occasions.

George Mathieson has won the Scottish Schools Indoor title, West and District Indoor and Outdoor and the Scottish Title indoor and Outdoor throwing the Shot putt. He has also represented the West and District team.

Avonside have a few promising youngsters as well, the likes of Andrew Sandilands, although only 12 he qualified to run for Scottish Schools last year only to be told he was to young. The previous year Andrew won the Primary Schools cross country championships.

John Thomson was picked as a reserve for the West District team last year qualifying in 11th place. They let him run and he beat all of the West District team easily.

Wendy Kennedy is another who has represented West District on track and over cross country, and at present Wendy is trying to recover fitness after injury.


Avonside is not just for the young, we have a group of men and women who joined to keep fit and got interested enough to run 10k road races and half marathons.

At present we are pushing for the "Proposed Track" to be completed for training next year.



A flash from the past




Lawrie Street and Argyle Street, from the Railway Bridge, c. 1890.




Stonehouse Public Park 1991.


